
Hervey Bay Regional Gallery is proud to report on our first two years of operations under the 2022-2026 Strategic Plan.



Fiona Foley: **Veiled Paradise**

Veiled Paradise surveyed three decades of Badtjala artist Dr. Fiona Foley's practice, presented together for the first time on Badtjala/ Butchulla Country.

This leading contemporary Aboriginal artist's work is informed by her ancestral connection to K'gari, drawing equally upon its serene beauty and the history of systemic violence and sexual exploitation perpetrated on its shores.

Incorporating original research around the Government-regulated opium trade and of the connection between sex and violence on the frontier and beyond, the artist refutes colonisation's attempts to erase her people and their histories. Tirelessly, through painting, photography, film, sculpture and printmaking, Foley gives voice to the dispossessed.


Veiled Paradise was the first major survey of the artist's practice initiated in Queensland. Curated by Angelina Hurley and toured by QUT Art Museum.

To companion a companion was a humorous, often cheeky, ode to the companion species that flit amongst us.

To companion a companion was an exhibition of new work by Argentinean-Australian artist Fernando do Campo that proposed humans as a companion species to birds. It was a collaborative project by Contemporary Art Tasmania, UNSW Galleries and PICA toured by Contemporary Art Tasmania.


The exhibition featured an impressive installation of paintings, video, textile, archival research and performance documentation from this leading Sydney-based artist.

To companion a companion included a suite of public programs drawing on the Fraser Coast's passion for birdlife including an educators preview event with the artist, multiple school excursions, a film screening, a panel discussion for youth week, and a free bird mask activity. The Dingo Project: Wongari

Originally curated for Ngununggula in the NSW Southern Highlands, *The Dingo Project: Wongari* shifted the focus of Djon Mundine's curatorial project to Butchulla country and the Wongari of K'gari.

Featuring artists from across the country alongside Butchulla perspectives, *The Dingo Project: Wongari* investigated the spiritual mythology and historical narratives that connect dingoes to Aboriginal Australia. An important new addition to this exhibition was the commissioning of *Wongari Stories*, a video produced by HBRG in collaboration with Queensland Parks and Wildlife Services, Butchulla Land and Sea Rangers, Butchulla Aboriginal Corporation and the Butchulla Native Title Aboriginal Corporation.

Featuring excerpts of interviews conducted with local Butchulla artists, cultural practitioners and elders, *Wongari Stories* was an insight into the profound connection that Butchulla people have with the Wongari (wild dingo) on K'gari.

Inspired by our state's passion for the greatest sporting rivalry of all time, *Origin Story* brought together artists from across the region to reflect on the cultural contribution of State of Origin to Queensland's identity.

From the tribal costuming of spectatorship to the adulation of our immortal state heroes, *Origin Story* celebrated the significance of Rugby League within the Fraser Coast community.

Origin Story included artworks by Joel Barney, Shane Jacob, Ashley Nixon, Phillip Piperides, Phoebe Paradise, Jack Rodgers, Teho Ropeyarn, Erika Scott and David Spooner. Programs included a live screening of State of Origin Game II at the gallery, a digital illustration workshop with Phoebe Paradise, and a kids dance workshop with former Broncos cheerleader Georgina Baumann.


By 2026, storytelling will become a foundational value in how we connect to community.

Presenting a selection of murals alongside his self-published wildlife documentaries, Alan Peebles: Bird Man reflected Alan Peebles' passion for the region's wildlife, forming a charming and idiosyncratic portrait of Hervey Bay through the eyes of one of its prominent advocates.

Alan Peebles passed in January 2022. Inspired by his enduring legacy as an artist and activist, Bird Man combined a selection of the Bus Shelter Paintings with a reel of Peebles' homemade wildlife documentaries. A muchloved feature of the Fraser Coast streetscape, these murals, and their re-contextualised display at the gallery shone a light on a local hero—and importantly, on the birdlife he fought to protect.



Collection Highlight Girra: Fraser Coast National Art Prize



Richardson's intricately detailed and impressively scaled work represents a significant early acquisition for the newly focused Hervey Bay Regional Gallery Collection.

In 2023 HBRG mounted the Girra: The Fraser Coast National Art Prize exhibition, a biennial prize that seeks to explore our reciprocal, inextricable relationship with the environment through contemporary art. Girra invited entries from artists working in any visual art medium from across Australia, offering a \$25,000 major acquisitive prize.

The inaugural winner of Girra: Fraser Coast National Art Prize, announced in September 2023, was Western Australian artist Anna Louise Richardson for her work I asked for a sign (wedge-tailed eagle), a 2-metre tall charcoal drawing on cement fibreboard.

Fiona Foley: Janjari



This project is commissioned and funded by Hervey Bay Regional Gallery with additional support from the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF), a partnership between the Queensland Government and Fraser Coast Regional Council to support local arts and culture in regional Queensland.

Janjari, a major new work by internationally renowned Badtjala contemporary artist Dr Fiona Foley marks the first acquisitive commission by Hervey Bay Regional Gallery since reopening in 2022.

Filmed entirely on K'gari, a flowing narrative guides the viewer from west to east of the world's largest sand island.


Laced with Fiona Foley's signature tension between a haunted past, contemplation of solitude and moments of joy and humour, this piece is a significant addition to the artist's oeuvre and HBRG's collection.



Gallery Shop & Makers' Markets

HBRG supports a sustainable creative economy through commercial opportunities for local makers. Over \$9,000 in commissions have been paid to artists through products sold in the HBRG Gallery Shop since April 2022.

In addition to the permanent retail space, HBRG held four quaterly Makers' Markets in City Park, hosting 31 stalls by local artists and makers across the year.

The success of the market contributed to an external commercial market organiser approaching Fraser Coast Regional Council to start a weekly farmers and artisan market in City Park. Local artisans, inclusing HBRG Makers' Market stallholders, have been offered regular and ongoing economic opportunities via these new markets.
